Personal

At the usual fortnightly meeting of the City Council last night a motion of sympathy, to Ald. W. J. McPhail, who in a family bereavement was buried in silence.

Mr. Frank Healey has severed his connection with the firm of D. J. Healey and Sons, of Bathurst South, in order to gain wider experience in the trade. He has been in the employ of this firm for the past eleven years, and has accepted a good position at Orange. He left Bathurst by the passenger train yesterday afternoon.

Speaking at the parishioners of All Saints' Cathedral function on Tuesday night, when the Rev. Canon Wilton, B.A., was made a presentation of a motor-car Mr. John Boyd paid a high tribute to the Canon. He said that during the five years Canon Wilton had been associated with the Cathedral parish as Sub-Dean, he had gained the highest esteem, not only of his own church people, but of the whole of the citizens of the city of Bathurst.

At last night's annual meeting of the Bathurst Motor Cycling Club, the Secretary, Mr. D. C. E. Noshitt, presented with a gift of leather-bound instruments for valuable services rendered during the year. Mrs. Noshitt also received a bottle of platinum. The presentation was made by the retiring president (Mr. A. Rigby) who referred in eulogistic terms to the capability of Mr. Noshitt. The two promptly acknowledged the gifts.

Mr. James E. Rogers, an old and highly respected former resident of Bathurst, died at Waverley yesterday at the age of 63 years. The remains were brought to Bathurst by this morning's mail train and will be interred in the Catholic portion of the Bathurst Cemetery this afternoon. The late Mr. Rogers was a native of Lagoon, but spent practically the whole of his life in Bathurst. He entered the employ of Messrs. John Meagher & Co. as a youth, and after spending many years with that firm, entered the employ of the firm of Messrs. Wright & Heaton, where his faithful services were recognised to the extent that he was eventually elevated to the position of manager of the firm's Bathurst branch. He filled that position for many years until he met with a serious accident at the railway station through falling from a railway truck. On his recovery from the injuries sustained he was appointed outdoor manager, which position he held until some two years ago, when he retired from active work and went to the Metropole to live. The late Mr. Rogers was an ardent Catholic and possessed a strong religious faith. He identified himself with all branches of church work, was an enthusiastic member of the Hibernian Society and was prominent in all the Catholic and Irish celebrations. He was a man of unexceptionable character, tolerant in all matters worldly, a conscientious employer and a man highly respected by everyone. He leaves a widow and a family of nine all of whom are

CROP PROSPECTS.

In many districts conditions have improved with respect to the wheat crop, as from one-half to over an inch of rain has fallen in many parts. The early sown crops are well for yard and developing grain and will undoubtedly yield well. The late sown crops are, of course, still doubtful. Everything, however, now points to a harvest, in many parts of at least 75 per cent. of last year's big result.
