## WAGES REDUCTION

### AS APPLIED TO RAILWAY WORKERS

QUESTION BEFORE THE COURT

SYDNEY, Thursday.  
Judge Curlewis to-day heard sev-  
eral arguments in the application by  
the Railway Commissioners for the  
variation of the Government Railways  
Award with regard to the traffic  
branch. Porters, ticket collectors,  
guards and signalmen, in accordance  
with the Board of Trade's declaration  
of a reduction of 3s. in the basic wage.  
A witness, a signalman from the  
East Greta line, called by Mr. Cor-  
ish, said that the duties of a signalman  
on the East Greta line were the  
same as those on the Government  
Railways.

The Judge said he found that the  
work of the employees on both lines  
was substantially of the same class.  
Br. Bretnall, for the Com-  
missioners, asked for an award pending  
the reference of the case to the Full  
Court owing to the serious financial  
position.
