WAGES REDUCTION

AS APPLIED TO RAILWAY WORKERS

QUESTION BEFORE THE COURT

branch. Porters, ticket collectors,
guards and signalmen, in accordance
with the Board of Trade's declaration
of a reduction of 3s. in the basic wage.

man on the East Greta line were the
same as those on the Government
Railways.
